Friday, March 29th







Michigan History

Beth Olem Cemetery is a Jewish cemetery begun in the 1860s. At the time, it was considered to be "out in the country," far removed from the city center of Detroit, and away from the German settlers of the area.

Eventually, Beth Olem found itself near the intersection of Clay and Smith Streets near the border of Detroit and Hamtramck.

In 1966, Dodge expanded their assembly plant around Beth Olem, but maintained a driveway so the cemetery would remain accessible.

In 1980, General Motors infamously demolished the Dodge Main Plant—and Poletown—and built their assembly plant at this location, and the cemetery was swallowed up and surrounded by the factory property.

General Motors allows visitation to the cemetery twice a year.

Selma Blair Faces Backlash For Islamophobic Comment On Video Slamming Rashida Tlaib

<u>Selma Blair</u> is under fire for an anti-Islam comment she posted on Instagram last week.

The "<u>Cruel Intentions</u>" star is one of the latest American actors to weigh in on the <u>Israel-Hamas conflict</u>, claiming that Islam has "destroyed Muslim countries" and then destroys "minds" in the United States.

Blair <u>made her remarks under an Instagram video</u> that slammed U.S. Reps. <u>Cori Bush</u> (D-Mo.) and <u>Rashida Tlaib</u> (D-Mich.) for voting <u>against a bill</u> with the stated goal of preventing immigration into the United States by people "who participated in or otherwise facilitated" Hamas' October attack on Israel.

Tlaib <u>said the bill</u> was "unnecessary" because it would be "redundant with already existing federal law." She also characterized it, along with three other bills related to immigration, as "inciting racism that puts our immigrant neighbors at risk."

Blair did not agree, as indicated by her viral and since-deleted comment.

"Thank you very much," <u>the actor wrote</u> in response to the video slamming Tlaib. "Deport all these terrorist supporting goons. Islam has destroyed Muslim countries and then they come here and destroy minds. They know they are liars. Twisted justifications. May they meet their fate."

Fellow actor <u>Michael Rapaport</u>, who <u>recently visited Israel</u> to support the country's army, replied, "Love it."

Debra Messing was even more effusive and wrote, "THANK YOU."

Blair did not immediately respond to HuffPost's request for comment.

Since Hamas' Oct. 7 attack killed around 1,200 people, Israel has killed more than 28,000 Palestinians, according to Gaza's Health Ministry. Hospitals, schools and refugee camps have been bombed, amid a have been bombed, and a have been bombed, and a <a href="https://example.com/have-been-bombed"

Selma Blair's deleted comment was echoed by fellow actors Michael Rapaport and Debra Messing.

<u>Social media users</u> couldn't help <u>but notice</u> that Islamophobic stances from entertainers aren't being met with the same industry backlash as comments from actors in support of Palestinian civilians. In November, <u>Melissa Barrerra</u> was <u>fired from the "Scream" franchise</u> after calling for a <u>ceasefire</u>.

Barrera's talent agency also <u>reportedly almost fired</u> her for sharing a link to the <u>United Nations Relief and Works Agency</u> — a humanitarian organization tirelessly providing wounded, displaced and traumatized Palestinians with food, water and shelter.

The Council on American–Islamic Relations, America's largest Muslim civil rights organization, weighed in on Saturday.

"Based on the hateful and ignorant remarks that Ms. Blair made, we doubt that she has ever engaged in any meaningful interactions with her Muslim colleagues in Hollywood or other members of the American Muslim community," wrote CAIR's Edward Ahmed Mitchell.

While <u>numerous Israeli</u> and <u>U.S. politicians</u> have conflated all <u>Gaza</u> civilians with Hamas members, the tenor around Israel's U.S.-backed bombing campaign has slowly begun to shift. This week, President Joe <u>Biden</u> called the military operation "<u>over the top</u>."

The White House has also released a new policy it claimed would ensure foreign countries don't use U.S. military aid to violate international law protecting civilians.

Meanwhile, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is currently considering a "massive" attack on Rafah. The southern city in the Gaza Strip now contains 1.5 million displaced Palestinians are sheltering.

Jews for Judaism

Jews for Judaism is an international organization that focuses on preventing Jews from converting to other faiths and reclaiming those who have already converted. It provides counseling services, education, and outreach programs to all Jewish denominations. It was established in 1985 by Rabbi Bentzion Kravitz.

The name Jews for Judaism was developed from "Jews for Jesus", one of the principal missionary organizations it was founded to counteract. One of its

prominent early members, Larry Levey, was a Jewish convert to Christianity who then converted back to Judaism and led the Baltimore office of Jews for Judaism for a number of years. In addition to its activities in response to Christian missionaries, Jews for Judaism has also been noted for its critiques of the Kabbalah Centre.

Jews for Judaism has two North American offices, located in Los Angeles, California and Toronto, Ontario


